Our approach What we are about...

The leadership of the ISBCC took a concerted effort to better understand who we are as a community, where we want to head, and how to best get there. To help do this, we engaged DinarStandard, an independent strategy and advisory firm to work on developing a strategic roadmap for the center. The roadmap will provide broad strategic priorities, programming focus areas and recommendations on organizational infrastructure improvements.

Understanding who we are and what we need as a community has been an essential part of this process. A rigorous effort to capture the community's voice included 9 focus groups, 1-on-1 interviews as well as online and print multi-lingual surveys. The result of this work to date is our alignment on a vision (what we want to become), mission (why we exist) and recommended strategy for programing areas.

Grow together spiritually as a community

With Islam being the fastest growing religion in the U.S.,

the ISBCC is playing a critical role in spiritually developing our diverse community and becoming a leading model of how best to apply Islam in America.

With the grace of Allah, our khutbas, halaqas and religious programs not only spoke to our adult population but also drew in over 300 youth weekly. Our Ramadan programming brought thousands of us closer to the Quran and our Creator, and ISBCC's educational programs served to further our understanding of our deen.

MAS Boston New Muslims Program at ISBCC

Since its opening, the ISBCC has attracted many who desire to learn about Islam and become acquainted with the Muslim community. The ISBCC offers these individuals an opportunity to participate in our weekly Islam 101 classes. By the Grace of Allah (swt) we welcome several new Muslims who accept shahadah here each month. May God protect and preserve them. Programs for supporting new Muslims and learning Islam:

Islam 101

Classes every Monday and Wednesday to teach the basics of Islam, build new friends, and integrate with the larger community and help new Muslims keep and mature family bonds and existing friendships within the larger society

Convertsations

Convertsations' is a monthly social gathering, devoted to supporting new Muslims and those interested in Islam, to learn from one another and build friendships

One-on-one

A one-on-one "buddy program" to help new Muslims learn how to pray and navigate their new faith.

Learning Qu'ran

MAS Quran Institute

A Quranic school with students ranging from age 6-60 that runs every Saturday and Sunday, with an overall aim to teach proper Quran recitation (tajweed) and its meaning. For the younger students, additional focus is placed on teaching Adab (manners) and the proper ways of prayers. Adolescent students, learn the Seerah and Hadith and are encouraged to find ways to incorporate different aspects of Islam into their daily lives. Adults are challenged to reflect deeply on the lessons from the different parables and verses of the Quran.

Ella Collins Institute

The objective is to establish a vibrant community by joining a classical understanding of Islam with modern scholarship and a healthy understanding of the current cultural context. We aim to bring forth the cultural relevance of Islam in America, and to develop the hearts and minds of the individuals in our communities.

Common Word Cafe

The cafe is a space for brothers and sisters, young and old, and Muslims and people of other faiths to build bonds and to better understand one another. We are blessed to have Baba and Mama who work to make the Cafe into a home away from home.

The Cafe also serves as a waqf project, providing over \$50K annually in revenue to support the ISBCC.

Build community together

Literary Series

The Literary Series is a new initiative at the Islamic Society of Boston Cultural Center. The goal of the program is to initiate conversations with authors who write on topics of interest to American Muslims, including, but not limited to: marriage within a Muslim context, the political and economic situations of Muslim-majority countries, and the challenges and opportunities of being Muslim in America. These talks give speakers the opportunity to discuss or read excerpts from their work, and enable audience members to pose questions and hear responses from those who have thought deeply about these issues. They are of interest to all those who are involved or concerned in issues facing Muslims in America, as well as those from Islamic faith or cultural backgrounds. These events meet monthly, according to the authors' availability, in the ISBCC café.



Civic Engagement Series

In March 2014, a team of community leaders ran a month-long drive to gain sustainable revenue for the ISBCC.
