

Dear ISBCC Community,

The last year marked a period of tremendous growth for your institution the ISBCC. We are grateful to Allah for this tawfiq (great fortune) and want to thank each and every one of you whose contribution has made this growth possible. May Allah accept from all of us.

Your voices through 400+ community surveys and 9 focus groups helped identify the three areas where we most needed to grow during the last year. You all wanted to see (1) better spiritual programming, (2) more opportunities for community members and Islamic institutions to serve the vision of Islam in America through the ISBCC in a unified way, and (3) the establishment of a culture of excellence (ihsan) at the center. With God's help and your contributions, I am delighted to report that we grew significantly in each of these areas.

We provided more spiritual programming for our community than ever before. Your contributions in time and resources helped us bring 18 visiting scholars, sign Ustadh AbdelRahman Murphy from the Qalam Institute for monthly visits, and launch a new teen program – ARKanum.

We also made progress in building a more unified and empowered community, serving Islam in America. Over **500 of our community members** gave their time and effort to better the center. **ISBCC sustainers** grew to over **430 regular monthly** contributors. They have begun serving as a backbone to the center, meeting quarterly and driving projects forward. And anecdotal evidence revealed: (1) different segments of our community feel more at home at the ISBCC than ever before and (2) local institutions like ICNA Relief, RIAC, and Masjid al-Qur'an feel more a part of the ISBCC than ever before.

Lastly, we made huge strides in ihsan (professionalism and excellence). We are finding our next Senior Imam through a transparent, professional and community-oriented process. We also put our first complete annual plan together to keep the ISBCC team laser focused on achieving our mission of teaching Islam in America.

The net result was that every scholar that came to the ISBCC – and this is no exaggeration – remarked that the ISBCC was unlike any other Muslim mosque and community center they had seen across America. While the last year was a major step in the right direction, we have much more to get right in each of those areas before achieving a standard of excellence.

I hope that the following pages of this annual report provide an opportunity for all of us to reflect on our accomplishments together last year and to thank Allah for all of his countless blessings. I also pray that this report inspires all of us to continue pushing your ISBCC towards being an institution and a community that the Prophet (P.B.U.H.) from the height of paradise could point to as a shining example of his community.

May Allah accept from all of us and grant us collectively a place in paradise next to cur beloved Prophet (P.B.U.H.) for all of our efforts.

ISBCC Sustainers are the power source of our center. In late 2013, when we asked you all how to become a more sustainably funded ISBCC, a unique and innovative solution emerged: the ISBCC Sustainers Program.

Sustainers are committed individuals who contribute financially on a regular monthly basis. Their investment is critical to furthering ISBCC's vision of fostering an inclusive community and supports programming rooted in our faith values.

As of Ramadan 2015, the community has grown to 427 Sustainers – strong, collectively giving \$240K annually to your center. Each Sustainer contributes what they can, from wherever in the world they are, some from as far as Australia, and represent the diversity of our community.

In addition to contributing financially, many are deeply engaged in the ISBCC's growth and help lead key institutional decisions and projects. Sustainers meet regularly each quarter and organize around critical projects based on community priorities. Examples of projects carried out by Sustainer-led teams this past year include:

#### 99 Names of Allah

Spiritual Engineering Using the 99 Names is a class developed by a group of sustainers to help increase spiritual knowledge at the ISBCC. Taught by Imam Taymullah Abdur-Rahman, this course enriches the community's understanding of Allah swt and His Names in everyday life.

#### **40 Acres Farm**

This spring, the ISBCC partnered with Forty Acres Farm in Granby, MA to offer locally-owned farm shares to the Boston community. Members receive weekly deliveries of zabihah halal meats and produce. This is an opportunity for the community to support local agriculture and gain more accountability with their food.

#### **Imam Search Committee**

Comprising 19 individuals representative of the diversity of our community, the Imam Search Committee shepherded us through a smooth Imam Search process. Community involvement and transparency were the guiding principles of this process. ISBCC community members had opportunities to engage with and provide feedback about each of the four final candidates through jummah khutbahs, halaqahs, workshops and community forums. We look forward to welcoming a new imam together as a community, insha'Allah.

#### **Sign Project**

A number of Sustainers suggested that a lawn sign would improve the center's visibility. The ISBCC will soon have a sign outside it identifying it as a faith institution. We took this project on because people didn't know what this building was. People have come in and tried to register for classes at Roxbury Community College or have thought it was part of the Reggie Lewis Center.





#### **Young Professionals Halaga**

A halaga series that focuses on issues relevant to Muslim young professionals in including balancing work and family life, health and self-care, current events and inclusivity in the community

#### Islam 101

Classes for new Muslims and those looking to learn about Islam have now expanded to four different programs in two locations. Alhamdullilah, Islam 101 averages 2-6 new students each week thanks to consistent advertising on the MBTA.

#### **Convertsations**

Conversations is a monthly group designed to enrich new Muslims in their faith journey as well as provide social support through the transition of incorporating different aspects of the deen into everyday life.

#### Mawlid

In January, the ISBCC hosted a celebration of Mawlid al-Nabi with Imam Khalid Nasr, Na'eel Cajee, Celene Ibrahim, Ayub Rahman and Dr Syed Irshad Ahamed Al Bukhari

#### **Eid al Adha**

During Dhul Hijjah, the center held community iftars, giyam with the theme of sacrifice, lessons from the life of Prophet Ibrahim and facilitated the purchase of Qurbani. The ISBCC, along with ICNA Relief, sponsored an Eid community barbecue to celebrate this blessed holiday together.

#### Ramadan

The ISBCC served the community with a range of programming during Ramadan 2014, with community iftars, tarawih prayers, community qiyams, halaqas and Qur'an circles as opportunities to fully experience the blessings of this holy month.



## **Youth Director**

My name is Abubakr Fakhry. By profession I am an Electrical Engineer. I have several years of experience in the Automation and Safety of Nuclear Power Plants. When I was young, I learned that life has a meaning, and those who live a meaningful life live longer. Their impact lives for as many years as Allah wants it to live. Because of this, I decided to change my career and focus my work with the Youth.

When I was introduced to the ISBCC, the notion of the "typical" masjid was dramatically changed in my head. I found a team of young enthusiastic executives who are open to new ideas and looking for real development/growth. I proposed some ideas that are considered not within the norm of youth programs and was met with a very positive reception. With that, I was inspired to start ARKanum.

ARKanum is designed to serve the youth of the greater Boston community ages between 12 and 16. The program consists of three main components: spiritual development, leadership development, and building youth character through embracing one's responsibility in serving the community. It is a uniquely blended learning curriculum where every student will participate in a three part holistic educational experience. Teens will participate in seminars and character-building adventures, including but not limited to local retreats (New Hampshire, New York, etc.), field trips (cruises, bike riding, etc.), monthly workshops, as well as international trip opportunities. Currently our management team consists of 9 members, who are all volunteers, responsible to develop all aspects of this new program. The program started at the end of May and serves 60 teens.

## What is ARKanum?

ARKanum is originally a Latin word that means "a group of people who seek knowledge". It relates to a group of people that believed everything had a specific "true name", with these true names bringing power and in that, a true definition of the object. We, like these people, are trying to learn the true name of Islam so that we can better understand it. We focus on "why" we preform certain acts of worship, rather than "how" we perform them, in order to truly understand its purpose. Replacing the original letter "c" in the word Arcanum with the letter "K" refers to the Prophet Noah's ARK, which was a symbol of change. Stated simply, we are agents of change in the way we address and understand our

## **What We Do**

ARKanum is a blended program that focuses on educational and entertainment programs aiming to discover and develop unique talents and skills for various age groups. Our mission is to develop well-rounded individuals, successful in all aspects of life including religion, education, health, self-awareness and leadership. Through the use of seminars, group discussions, field trips, as well as local retreats and international trips, here at ARKanum, we feel it is a moral obligation to develop our youth to become the leaders of our future generations.

ARKanum strives to serve the teens of the greater Boston community. The health of our community – its programs, its purpose and its people - is not only a passion, but a sense of responsibility and commitment. As members of our local and global communities, we strive to ensure that knowledge, religion and cultural values are preserved and maintained to not only empower ourselves, but to strengthen our community and prepare ourselves for the future.

## **ARKanum Methodology**

In our uniquely blended learning curriculum, every student will participate in a three part holistic educational experience. Teens will participate in seminars and character-building adventures, including local retreats (New Hampshire, New York), field trips (cruises, bike riding) monthly qiyams, and international trips opportunities. Through the innovative structure of our curriculum, we are not only developing leaders within our community but the future leaders of a generation.

## **ARKanum Projects**

A core concept within our curriculum is the development of a "project", where students are assigned a semester long assignment to complete. In phase 1 of our curriculum, which began on June 6th and concludes December 12th, participants will be divided into teams who will compete with one another to create a short movie. Through editing, developing, directing and producing of this short movie, students will raise awareness about a specific topic in the community that they feel they could impact. In developing an innovative idea, raising awareness about community related topic, and collaborating with one another to produce a short movie, our goal is to support individuals who will become well-rounded contributors to society. The winners of the phase 1 competition will receive an all-inclusive trip to Turkey to experience Islamic art and architecture and to bond with their teammates on an international scale. The youth of today, the leaders of our future generation, and our community voices are being built inside the doors of ARKanum.

## **Programs Director**

In 2014 the ISBCC launched a new program, "Celebrating our Cultures." This program had previously focused on one culture by inviting a speaker to speak about and bring the food of that culture. It was a good program, but I felt that something was missing. I wanted to move beyond celebration and make a program that is interactive, where community members speak to each other rather than listening to a speaker.

After some time of reflection and asking around, I discovered that even though our community is very diverse, people are not well connected. In fact, the feeling of "loneliness" that many of our community members expressed in different ways made it obvious that there is a need for social, fun, and interactive events. These events should empower community members and give them a share in its governance. With the help of Sister Malika MacDonald Rushdan, the director of ICNA MA, we came up with our exciting new initiative: the Community Social Event Series.

This series, in partnership with ICNA Relief MA, aims to give community members from different backgrounds an opportunity to get to know one another through fun social activities. 

## Communicating

## Islam in the media

Due to our growing stature in Boston and New England, the ISBCC is often the first stop for the media to get answers to important questions or to get leads on stories regarding Islam and Muslims. Without any real options of re-directing the media to other professional American-Muslim media institutions - our American-Muslim community simply lacks these institutions.

The ISBCC embraced these media inquiries as an opportunity to speak to the millions of readers, listeners and viewers throughout America and the world on Islam in America. Thanks to funding from the Proteus Fund and the Hyams Foundation, we hired a media consultant in Ms. Cheri Andes for a six month period over the last year, so that we could do this work with professional excellence.

The impact of this work has been monumental. Not only have we been able to tell the truth about our community and our faith in the midst of the Tsarnaev trial and the Rahim shooting, but we also have begun painting a proactive portrait of what Islam really means

Moreover, through all this work we have leveraged Ms. Andes to train over 200 leaders across Massachusetts in handling the media by holding joint trainings with Mass Muslims, the Islamic Council of New England, and other local mosques. While the ISBCC was mentioned in over 40 news stories throughout the year, we highlight on the next page some of the more seminal examples of our work in the media.


